
St Patrick's Parish News



Dear Friends

In St John's Gospel, just before Jesus dies, he cries out, "...I thirst...". Soldiers soak a sponge in sour wine and hold it to his lips on a hyssop branch. Then, when Jesus has drunk the wine, he bows his head, says "...It is finished..." and dies.

At first glance the meaning of 'I thirst' is quite obvious. It is a painful and poignant moment in a grim story: Jesus is dying on the cross, he is in agony and he longs for a drink to ease the pain. What more is there to say? It is a ghastly death, but scripture tells us much more. The Jesus we see thirsting on the cross is the One who, born in human likeness, has emptied himself of equality with God, taking the form of a servant, and becoming obedient even to death.

In Jesus we see God thirsting on the cross, carrying the world's suffering, sharing our humanity. As Christians, we are sometimes guilty of rushing swiftly from the agony of the cross to the blessed relief of Easter morning. But there are times when we need to stand at the foot of the cross and hear, over and over again, Jesus' words: 'I thirst'.

There is a story of a mother whose little girl is late home one day. As the minutes tick by the mother gets increasingly worried. Five minutes go by, then ten, and the mother does not know where the little girl can be. As more time passes the mother starts to imagine the terrible things that may have befallen her daughter. The mother is distraught and on the verge of calling the police when, suddenly, the little girl waltzes in through the back door without a care in the world. The mother sweeps her daughter up in her arms, deeply relieved that she is safe. But, as is the way with parents, relief quickly turns to anger. "Where have you been?" the mother cries. "Didn't you realise how worried I would be about you"? It becomes clear that the little girl had been next door with their recently widowed neighbour. "What have you been doing worrying that poor lady"? the mother asks crossly. "I haven't been worrying her" said the little girl "I have been comforting her". "Comforting her"? retorted the mother, "What could you possibly do to comfort her"? The little girl replied, "I climbed into her lap and cried with her".

This is a supreme example of our relationship with God at the crucifixion. Jesus, the one who thirsts on the cross, is also the one who climbs into our lap and cries with us. He shares the

most tremendous joys of human life and the most heartbreaking sorrows. On the cross, when Jesus cries out in thirst, the misery and anguish he is suffering are not just his, though the pain is very real: they resonate with every human cry and with all human suffering. Wherever there is pain in the world, whenever someone cries out, thirsty for water, afflicted with grief, tormented by pain, or craving love, we hear the cry of the One who has come to earth to show us what God is like. We discover that God is thirsting too. In the suffering, thirsting love of Christ we see the thirsting, suffering God.

Small Things

On St Patrick's Day each year crowds of people make their way to Slemish, and many of them make it to the top. I'm sure they see that as an achievement, and it certainly is. Mind you, Slemish is hardly a mighty mountain. In comparison to the great mountains of the world, it is a mere pimple. 600 feet is the height difference between the visitor centre and the summit. The summit of Everest stands over 29,000 feet above sea level – that means it is roughly 50 times the height of Slemish.

I have flown up to and around Everest and seen it in all its majesty. I have done a little trekking in some of the Nepalese mountain ranges, but I never trekked up to the base camp of Everest even though it is not that demanding – it is a very crowded route. As to climbing Everest, that obviously would be unthinkable.

Yet, in a sense, I have climbed Everest. How come, you might ask? By climbing Slemish 50 times and thus reaching the height of Everest. In no way could I possibly do the big thing, but I could do the small thing again and again and again.

This makes me think. Most of us will probably not achieve great things in our lives: yet we can do small things again and again. Will this not be a great achievement? The small things, then, are important, especially as they mount up. The smile we give someone, the word of encouragement, the attention we pay to someone, the simple act of kindness, the warm tone to our conversation, the expression of apology or thanks – all of these little things, as they are repeated, add up to the big difference we make.

We may be ashamed of those who do great things, or we may admire them. Yet let us recognise that doing small things again and again is, of itself, great. Jesus himself commends such small things "...If anyone gives a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is my disciple, he will certainly not lose his reward...". So, plenty of those cups of cold water – those little acts of kindness, please!
